Disaster Relief Work of Sewa Bharati and Sangh in Jammu & Kashmir and Uttarakhand

Recently, natural calamities in various regions of Jammu & Kashmir and Uttarakhand placed many families under severe hardship. In such times of crisis, the Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh and Sewa Bharati volunteers remained continuously engaged in relief and rehabilitation efforts. In Bheja village of **Bhaderwah** region in Jammu & Kashmir, 3–4 houses were swept away due to heavy rainfall. Sewa Bharati and Sangh karyakartas distributed essential materials such as food, bedding, and utensils to the affected families. Similarly, in **Kishtwar (Padar)**, a cloudburst caused the death of 42 persons and injured more than 100. Here, Sewa Bharati Doda–Kishtwar undertook critical disaster management responsibilities by providing ambulance service, food distribution, temporary shelter, and other necessary services. In other parts of Jammu & Kashmir as well, volunteers worked day and night to deliver relief supplies such as flour, food, and water, ensuring that no family remained hungry or helpless.



In Uttarakhand too, disasters impacted several areas. In **Uttarkashi**, volunteers remained actively engaged in service activities, where 70-year-old Vibhag Sanghchak Shri Gulab Singh Negi ji inspired everyone by joining hands with the youth. In **Tharali (Chamoli)** and the villages of Doongar, Baredth, and Chenagad in **Rudraprayag** district, volunteers promptly delivered relief, including food, clothing, and essential items. The objective of these efforts is not only to provide immediate relief but also to secure rehabilitation and the future of the affected families. The dedication of Sewa Bharati and Sangh volunteers stands as an inspiration to society, conveying the message that in times of calamity, organization and society together can overcome every difficulty.

In times of disaster, the greatest necessity is that we all come together on the basis of humanity to support one another.

Prant and Vibhag Sangathan Mantri Training Varg

From 19th to 22nd August 2025, Rashtriya Sewa Bharati organized a four-day "Prant and Vibhag Sangathan Mantri Training Varg" at Sewa Bharati Hospital, Udaipur (Rajasthan).



In the inaugural session, Akhil Bharatiya Sangathan Mantri Shri Sudhir Kumar ji of Rashtriya Sewa Bharati guided the participants as the chief speaker. The session was also graced by Akhil Bharatiya Sah Sewa Pramukh Shri Rajkumar Matala ji of Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh, Joint Mahamantri Shri Vijay Puranik ji of Rashtriya Sewa Bharati, and Akhil Bharatiya Prakashan Pramukh Shri Moolchand Soni ji.

The “**Apna Bhojanalay**” run by Sewa Bharati in Government Medical College, Jammu, completed two years. DAKSHIN KE SENAPATI – YADVARAO JOSHI



A Marathi-speaking youth of short stature and simple appearance, yet with unwavering determination, devoted fifty years of his life to South India and created history. Before coming to Karnataka as a Prachark, Yadvarao Joshi had hardly ever heard Kannada, but he spent his entire life winning the hearts of Kannada-speaking people. He never tried to create followers; rather, he extended his hands in service to all, and people naturally followed him. It was from Yadvarao ji's inspiration that Rashtrrothana Parishad was established. On one hand, it runs the largest blood bank in Bangalore, where poor patients get blood at the lowest cost, and on the other, it runs free coaching centres for children living in slums. In Kerala too, Yadvarao ji was the motivating force behind Bal Gokulam, which connected small children with the culture of Bharat.

Born on 3rd September 1914 in Nagpur, on the day of Anant Chaturdashi, in a family of Vedic scholars, Yadvarao ji's childhood passed in poverty and scarcity. When the time came to earn money to overcome hardships, he chose instead to become a Prachark after completing M.A. and Law. In those days, it was rare to find people so well educated. Yadvarao ji renounced everything that could bring him name or recognition.

Known as Bal Bhaskar, Yadvarao ji's musical talent was acknowledged even by Pandit Bhimsen Joshi. Yet, for Sangh work, he renounced music as well. He was the first to sing the Sangh prayer "Namaste Sada Vatsale" publicly. He was once accused of instigating Godse in Gandhi's assassination case and went to jail during both the bans on Sangh, including during the Emergency of 1975. Each time, he returned with doubled energy for Sangh work. Called the Senapati of Dakshin, Yadvarao ji laid the foundation of Sangh work in Tamil Nadu, Kerala, Karnataka, and Andhra Pradesh, integrating Sewa into Sangh activities. His vision that Sevavratris too can be trained gave birth to the Hindu Seva Pratishthan in Bangalore. This institution trained young boys and girls in social service and sent them for three years of sewa in interior villages. So far, more than 5,000 Sevavratris have been trained, many of whom dedicated their entire lives to this mission.

Living a life of utmost simplicity himself, Yadvarao ji worked for the nation and society till his last breath. He was the Sangh's first unofficial Akhil Bharatiya Sewa Pramukh, who connected Sangh with Sewa even before the creation of the Sewa Vibhag.
